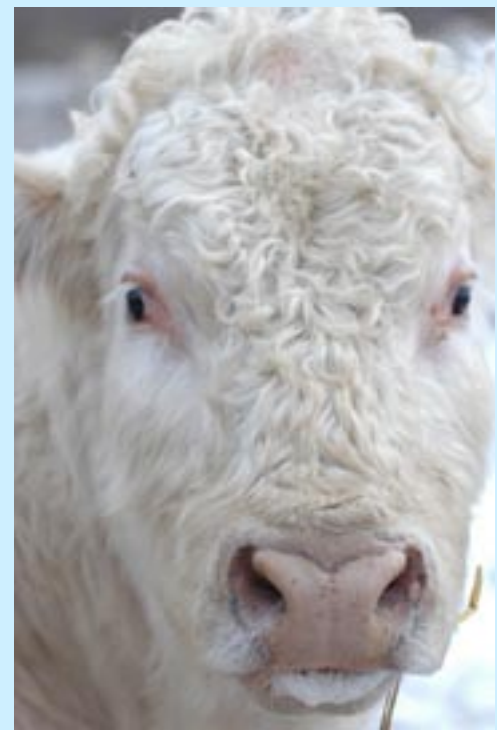
Barns have an upstairs and a downstairs. The upstairs

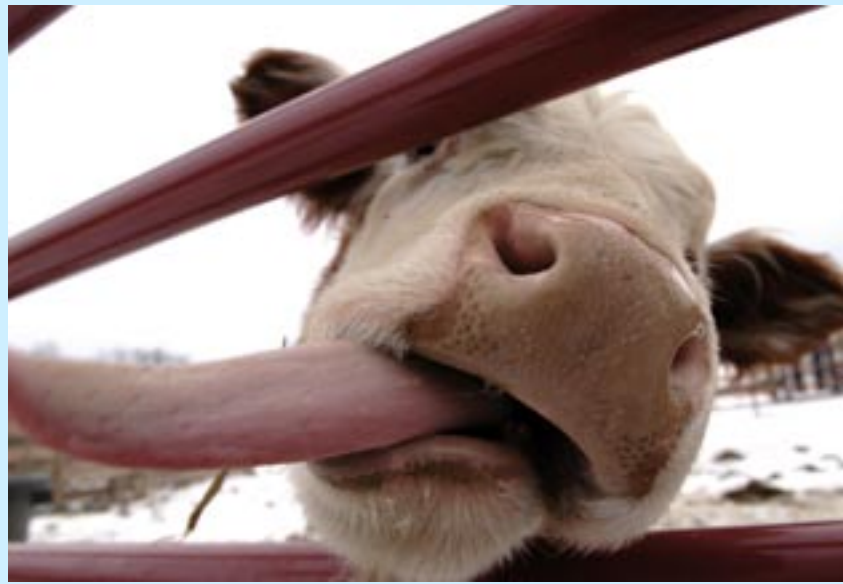
Did you know that cows don't see as well straight ahead? Their eyes are on the side of their head.
